New Developments IN DOWNTOWN

Over the past year there have been several new developments in the downtown area. Such new development increases the tax base for the Town of Ocean City, Worcester County, and State of Maryland.

Four of these projects are highlighted below:

HOTEL MONTE CARLO SUITES

The DiFilippo family constructed a seven unit hotel, at 1107 Baltimore Ave., that was ready for the 2009 summer season.

DOUGH ROLLER RESTAURANT

After a fire destroyed this popular eatery in 2008, the Gibbs Family built a new and larger restaurant. Located at S. Division St. and Boardwalk, this restaurant opened in April 2009.

AMERICANA SUITES

This 16 unit rental suites with employee housing opened in 2009. It is located at Philadelphia Avenue and 10th Street.



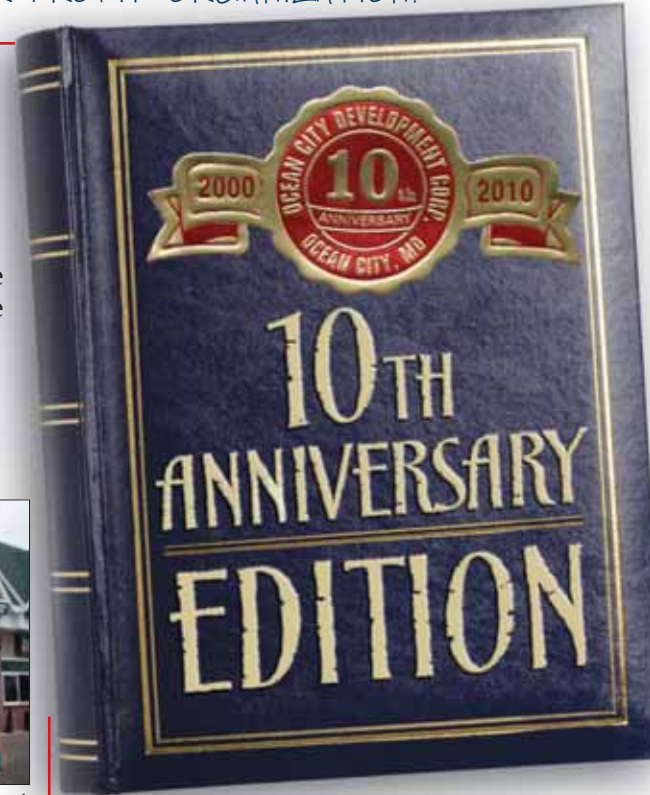
Sleep Inn Suites & Hotel

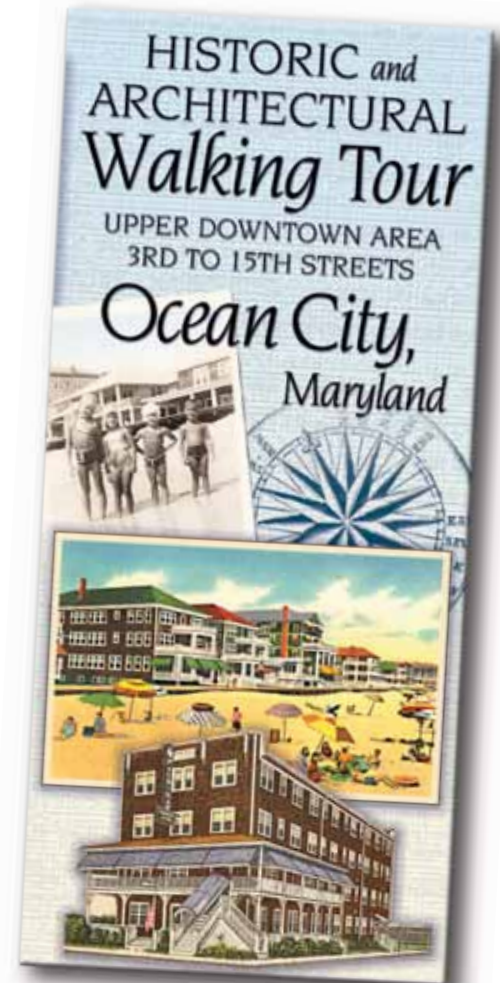

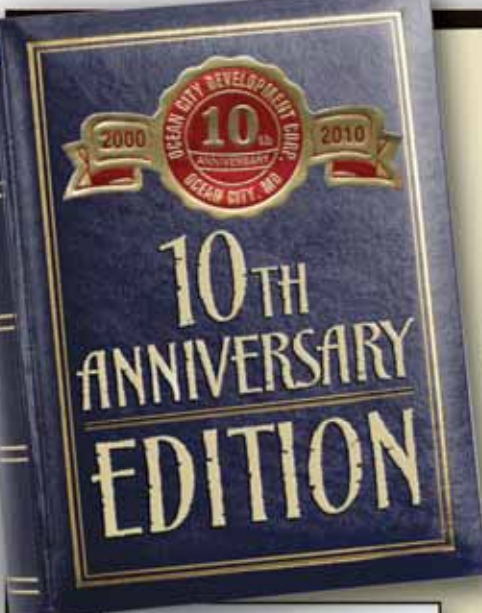
DOWNTOWN WALKING TOUR offered to local groups

Tarry-A-White Guest House

TARRY-A-WHILE GUEST HOUSE -
 This 1897 structure was destined for demolition to make room for a new construction project. The OCDC and Town of Ocean City moved this three story structure to its new location at 108 Dorchester Street. It was fully renovated and now serves as the OCDC office and provides employee housing.

STREETSCAPE OF SOUTH 1ST STREET -
 Completed in 2006 this project created an attractive pedestrian way between the Boardwalk and Baltimore Avenue. This brick paver walkway removed the vehicular traffic from the street increasing the safety for pedestrians walking between the Trimper Amusement ride areas. Public art is also imbedded on this street.

SOMERSET PLAZA - Completed in 2002 this project transformed a dead end street abutting the Boardwalk into a semi-pedestrian way, which provides a direct linkage to the Boardwalk and inner blocks of downtown Ocean City. Besides the attractive look with its brickpavers and tree canopy, the plaza allows space for special events and uses in the public right of way.

SUNSET PARK - Opened for the 2007 summer season, this linear park is Ocean City's newest public park and is located on the Bay along South Division Street. Since completion, the Town of Ocean City and OCDC have partnered to provide various music events at this beautiful location.

DOWNTOWN ENTRANCEWAY SIGN - Using a Community Legacy Program grant, the OCDC installed this new welcome sign to downtown Ocean City. The sign is located at the foot of the Route 50 bridge on City owned property.

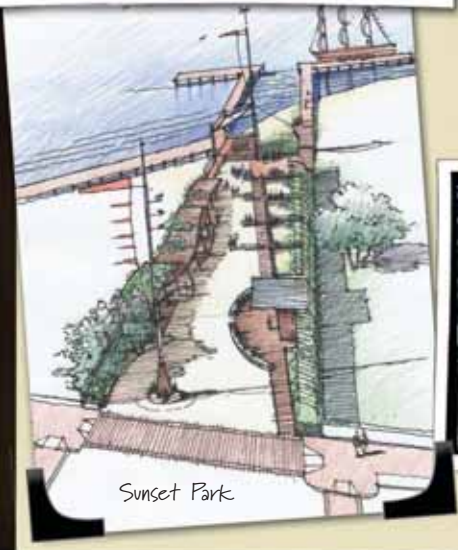
Land Acquisition

Property Values

During this first decade of the new century, substantial redevelopment in the downtown area produced significant tax revenues for the City, County and State of Maryland.

Between 2000 and 2008, taxable values of total downtown properties (between the Inlet and 4th Street) increased 299%.

Façade Improvement Program

Since 2002, the OCDC has received several funding awards from the Maryland Department of Housing and Community Development to implement its façade program. This program consists of providing matching funds to assist businesses and property owners to renovate the exterior of buildings.

To date, this OCDC program has been used to renovate 75 buildings in downtown Ocean City. Seven other buildings are presently being renovated. Over \$3.1 million of private investment has been spent in these older buildings.

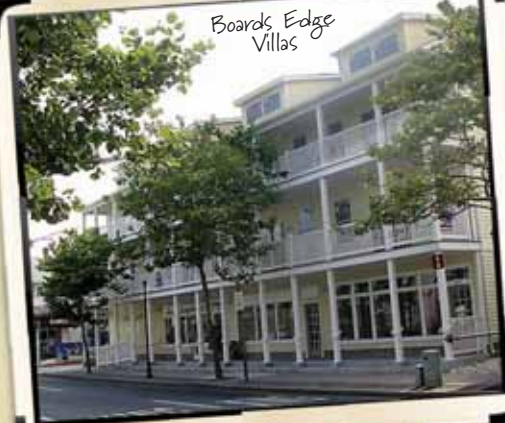

Plaque Program

Bronze plaques have been installed on twenty various buildings, in downtown, to recognize their historic significance. Fifty more plaques are proposed for buildings in the upper downtown area.

OCDC Employee Housing

The OCDC completed its third season of managing housing for the Ocean City Beach Patrol employees. In 2007, the Tarry-A-While Guest House at 108 Dorchester Street was opened after extensive renovations. This facility provides thirteen beds for the OCBP employees. For the past two years, the OCDC has managed the Somerset Street building. This house provides decent and affordable housing to ten other OCBP employees. Overall, the OCDC provides and manages housing for over ten percent of total Beach Patrol employees.

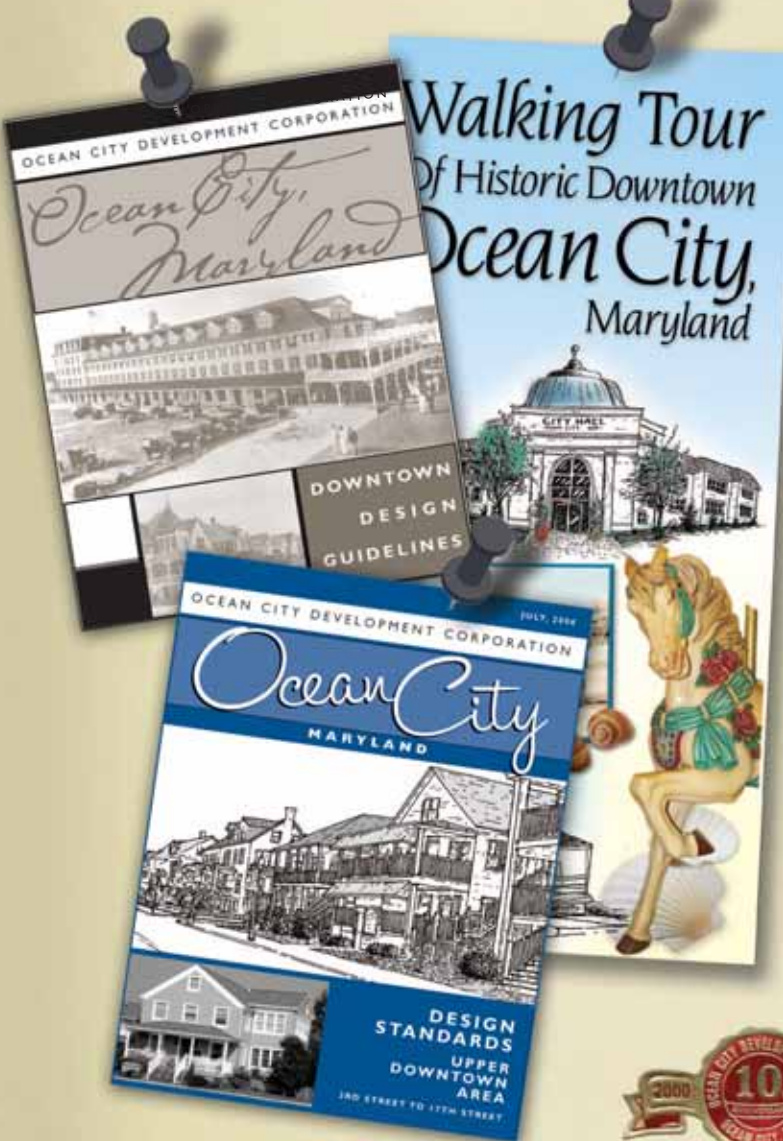

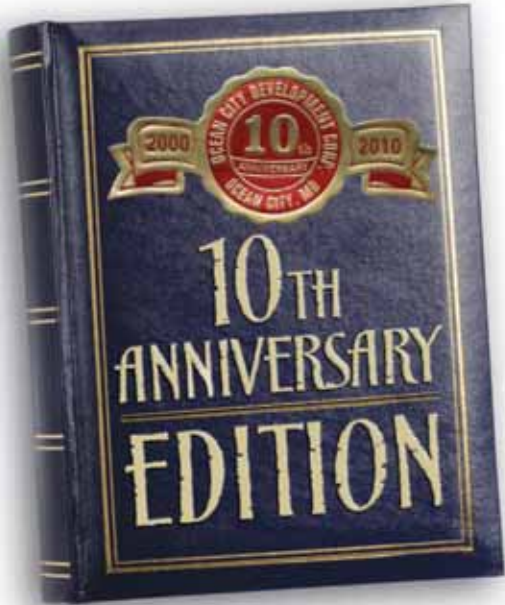

The Town of Ocean City, Worcester County Commissioners, private contributions, membership dues, grants, and fundraisers fund the OCDC. The OCDC's fifteen member Board of Directors is elected by its membership, and is comprised of business owners, residents, and property owners of the downtown area and surrounding areas. The OCDC employs a full time executive director and a part time administrative assistant. The OCDC also has 10 committees comprised of members who provide countless hours of volunteer hours and remain the core of the OCDC organization.
